

FOLTC is offering select items in the November Honor System Book Sale at the MRL Bookstore in Young Harris. It will **ONLY** include adult paperback books, CDs, DVDs, and jigsaw puzzles.

Adult paperbacks, CDs, & DVDs – 50 cents each or 3/\$1: Trade paperbacks, mass market paperbacks, large print paperbacks, CDs, and DVDs. **Jigsaw puzzles, 50 cents each.**

Signs are posted for the on-sale shelved paperbacks to the right just inside the door. Other on-sale paperbacks and items are on the tables. Place your exact amount owed in the red money box near the door. Sorry but no change is available. Consider any extra as a donation or pick out more items. Thanks for understanding. Books will be replenished on a regular basis as space allows. The Bookstore is open MWF from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m., though closed for Thanksgiving on November 24th and 26th. All sale proceeds will benefit the Towns County Libraries. When shopping in the bookstore, remember your

"Storybook Lane," a new outdoor Postage Stamp Mural produced by the Appalachian Mural Trail, is scheduled for unveiling at 2:00 in the afternoon on Friday, November 5th, 2021. The public is invited. The event will take place outside Mountain Regional Library at 698 Miller St, Young Harris, GA 30582, telephone 706-379-3732.

The colorful 7 foot high "Storybook Lane" mural creates a fantasy world of children's book characters from works by local children's book authors Marcia Hawley Barnes, Brenda Kay Ledford, Amy Ammons Garza, and Carroll S. Taylor. The mural is designed to "save the books." Mountain Regional Library is scheduled to be featured on the Appalachian Mural Trail where the mural is showcased so folks can read about and find directions to the mural. BOARD MEMBER BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS

<u>The Wild Girl</u> by Jim Fergus. As a young man, Ned was part of an expedition to find and free a boy who was captured by the Apaches, using an Apache girl as ransom. Ned had photographed the girl, and her narrative combines with extracts from Ned's diaries to tell a story that resonates years later and that lays bare some of the harsh truths about the American presence in the West.

The Day the World Came to Town: 9/11 in Gander, Newfoundland by Jim DeFede. When 38 jetliners bound for the United States were forced to land at Gander International Airport in Canada by the closing of U.S. airspace on September 11, 2001, the population of this small town on Newfoundland Island swelled from 10,300 to nearly 17,000. This book recounts the inspiring story of the residents of Gander, Canada, whose acts of kindness have touched the lives of thousands of people and been an example of humanity and goodwill.

<u>The House in the Cerulean Sea</u> by T. J. Klune. Linus Baker leads a quiet, solitary life. At forty, he lives in a tiny house with a devious cat and his old records. As a Case Worker at the Department in Charge of Magical Youth, he spends his days overseeing the well-being of children in government-sanctioned orphanages. This enchanting story is about the profound experience of discovering an unlikely family in an unexpected place—and realizing that family is yours.

HAPPENINGS AT YOUR LIBRARIES, Heather Welch, Public Services Coordinator

Mountain Regional Library is thrilled to become a part of the Appalachian Mural Trail! Our mural is called *Storybook Lane* by Doreyl Ammons Cain and consists of characters from local children's book authors Marcia Hawley Barnes, Brenda Kay Ledford, Amy Ammons Garza and Carroll S. Taylor. It will be placed outside Mountain Regional Library in Young Harris with an **unveiling on Nov. 5th at 2 pm.** Our hope is that it becomes a landmark in the community and brings people into the library.

Mountain Regional Arts and Crafts Guild has partnered with us to do 12 art classes - November to May. The first one will be a watercolor bookmark, and space will be limited. Once details are finalized, information will be available on our Facebook page and within the libraries.

Other new partners are the Ferst Readers of Towns County. They will be doing storytimes the first and third Thursday monthly. We're excited because their organization focuses on early literacy and getting books into the hands of children.

Through November our libraries will be accepting donations of wrapping paper, boxes, and Christmas decorations. Can we count on you to share some for our kids? Then we will be scheduling **Wrapping Parties** in early December, one day at each branch. People may come wrap their presents and have a cup of hot chocolate as our gift to them.

In January, we anticipate setting up one-on-one classes to help people learn how to download e-books and e-audiobooks onto their devices. Watch for details.

LIBRARY STATISTICS AND MORE, Marlene Cannon, TCL Manager

Even a pandemic cannot stop our libraries! During the first fiscal quarter of FY2021-22, starting July 1st, the circulation statistics might surprise you!

- 11,201 Physical circulation of books, DVDs, audio books
- 1,790 E-book circulations
- 10,651 Attendance
- 30 New library cards issued
- 491 New items added to the collections

LITTLE FREE LIBRARY TURNS ONE



In February 2020 the FOLTC board voted to fund a Little Free Library. Sole Commissioner Cliff Bradshaw gave permission to install it at the Towns County Beach and Playground. Jerome Laux has built many things for the library, so we asked him to draw up the plans and build our project. FOLTC member and former art professor Dick Aunspaugh did a beautiful job painting our Little Free



Library with bright, colorful flowers. The planning and coordinating for this

project took place during the early months of the COVID pandemic, so we had many unexpected, frustrating delays. Our project was finally completed in October 2020 and was registered on the www.littlefreelibraries.org map with more than 100,000 others in the United States and over 108 countries. We just celebrated our One Year Steward Anniversary and are happy to say that our Little Free Library has been very popular at the beach and playground.

HISTORY OF THE PINES SYSTEM, Doris L. Tilly, Founding President

I read two or more books every week and always have several on hand. My interests vary from gardening, birds, butterflies, genealogy, children's books, international spy novels with a little romance, or novels about the southeastern USA. As a very frugal person I could never purchase all the books I read. I turn to PINES: Public Information Network for Electronic Services. You will be pleased to know that former governor Zell Miller had the idea to put all of Georgia's county libraries in a statewide system. Roy Barnes, the next governor, put the idea into operation in 1999. The system has been copied world-wide with British Columbia, Canada, being the first to ask for permission to copy the PINES system.

From the PINES internet information: "PINES is the public library automation and lending network for 300 libraries and affiliated service outlets in 51 library systems covering 146 counties in GA. This is a 'borderless library' that provides equal access to information for all Georgians. Georgians with a PINES library card have access to materials beyond what is available on their local shelves and enjoy the benefits of a shared collection of 10.6 million books and other materials that can be delivered to their home library free of charge. If you are a resident of GA, you are eligible to receive a free PINES library card.

PINES runs on the Evergreen automation system, an op-source system originally developed in-house by Georgia Public Library Service and now is used worldwide by more than 1500 libraries. It is provided at no cost to GA library systems. PINES has enabled local libraries state-wide to reduce software expenditures by approximately \$10 million a year. It is partially assisted with funds from the Library Services and Technology Act through the Institutes of Museum and Library Services." State and Federal funds are used.

Elizabeth McKinney, PINES Director, answered my questions by phone concerning the PINES system. She has been with the system for many years and helped me in March, 2009, when I wrote an article about the PINES system for the Newsletter. From Director McKinney:

- 2,000,000 GA residents are actively using the PINES system in 2021.
- The Kid's Catalog was added in March of 2014, providing children access to the system via a kid-friendly interface. More is in the works as students of all grades will be given access to PINES via a PLAY card without any future fines and without the need for a parent signature. Soon you will be able to renew your library card online with the PINES system.
- The PINES Committee has an annual survey that is used for future improvements. Be sure to complete the survey to have your suggestions heard.

You now have more information about your wonderful PINES system. We should all be proud to live in a State that values libraries and continues to make good use of our resources for every resident.

Bookstore sales were up 10% for a 3-month period in 2021 over the same time period in 2019. Sales in the new Towns County Library bookstore contributed 25% of the 2021 money.

In the past 3 months FOLTC committed \$8,000 to the libraries for the 2022 summer reading program, the Commissioner's Challenge Grant, a new bookcase for the Towns County Library bookstore, and various library activities.
